## **ELDERSHIP ESSENTIALS**

## SYNONYMS FOR THE SAME OFFICE

(From three Greek words—presbuteros, episkopos, poimano)

Elders (most common term in the Bible) = bishops = overseers = shepherds = pastors

**They could also be called rulers:** "Obey them that have the rule over you, and submit yourselves: for they watch for your souls..." (Heb. 13:17; cf. Heb. 13:7; 1 Thess. 5:12; 1 Tim. 5:17; 1 Pet. 5:1-4).

OFFICE	SCRIPTURES
BISHOPS = ELDERS	"ordain <u>elders</u> in every city, as I had appointed thee: If any be blameless, the husband of one wife, having faithful children not accused of riot or unruly. For a <u>bishop</u> must be blameless" (Titus 1:5-7; cf. 1 Tim. 3:1-7; 1 Pet. 5:1-4).
ELDERS = OVERSEERS	"And from Miletus he sent to Ephesus, and called the <u>elders</u> of the churchthe Holy Ghost hath made you <u>overseers</u> " (Acts 20:17, 28).
OVERSEERS = SHEPHERDS	"take heed toall the flock, among which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to shepherd the church" (Acts 20:28 NKJV; cf. 1 Pet. 2:25).
SHEPHERDS = PASTORS	The Greek root in "feed/shepherd" (poimano) in Acts 20:28 and 1 Peter 5:2 is from the same root in "pastors" (poimen) (Eph. 4:11). Poimen is most often translated as "shepherd(s)". The word "pastors" is related to the word "pasture," indicating elders overseeing the flock (1 Pet. 5:1-4).

## **OTHER INFORMATION**

**ALWAYS A PLURALITY OF THESE MEN** mentioned over each congregation—never one man as "the pastor" over a congregation.

"...they had ordained them <u>elders</u> [plural, JPH] in every <u>church</u> [singular, JPH]..." (Acts 14:23; cf. Acts 15:22; 20:17, 28; Phil. 1:1; Titus 1:5; Heb. 13:7, 17; James 5:14).

## **NOT THE SAME AS AN EVANGELIST**, who is mentioned separately:

"And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, <u>evangelists</u>; and some, <u>pastors</u> and teachers" (Eph. 4:11).

MUST MEET GOD'S REQUIREMENTS (1 Tim. 3:1-7; Titus 1:5-11; 1 Pet. 5:1-3).
